Financial Support for Families

Bayside P-12 College understands that some families may experience financial difficulty and offers a range of support options, including:

- the Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (for eligible students)
 - The Victorian Government has again committed to providing eligible students with Camps, Sports & Excursion funds (CSEF). These funds are paid to the school to use towards excursions, incursions, and camps for eligible students. To be eligible for the funding, a parent or legal guardian must be the holder of a current Healthcare card or Pension card or be a temporary foster parent on the first day of Term 1 or Term 2. Parents who are eligible for CSEF will be required to complete the CSEF application form attached. Applications close at the end of Term 2, 2024.
- State School Relief funding (for eligible students)
 - State Schools' Relief (SSR) works closely with all government schools across Victoria. Each year SSR assists families who are experiencing financial disadvantage with school clothing, shoes, and other essential items. SSR is only able to respond to requests from schools and does not engage directly with parents. Parents are encouraged to talk to their campus wellbeing officer so that school staff can assess a parent's or child's needs and their eligibility for assistance.
- Western Chances Scholarship (for eligible students)
 - Scholarships are intended to provide acknowledgment and assistance for talented and motivated young people facing barriers to completing their education. A Western Chances scholarship applicant must have an identifiable talent or pathway. To be eligible for a scholarship, a young person must be aged between 12 and 25 years, enrolled at a government secondary school, and be a resident of one of the six municipalities in Melbourne's west. Western Chances supports young people on their educational journey for as long as the need exists. Scholarships are awarded at the discretion of the Western Chances Scholarship assessors, to applicants who best meet the criteria.

FREE INSTRUCTION

Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis.

• Schools may also invite parents to supply or purchase educational items to use and own (e.g. textbooks, stationery, digital devices).



FINANCIAL HELP FOR FAMILIES

- Schools put in place financial hardship arrangements to support families who cannot pay for items or activities so that their child doesn't miss out.
